TikTok being used by 16% of British toddlers, Ofcom finds

Three-year-olds are on the video-sharing platform and it may be affecting their attention span

British toddlers are increasingly likely to be users of <u>TikTok</u>, with a substantial number of parents saying their preschool children use the video service despite the app supposedly being restricted to those aged 13 and older.

About 16% of three- and four-year-olds view TikTok content, according to research commissioned by media regulator Ofcom. This rises to a third of all children in the five- to seven-year-old age group.





He has also shut down his Hustlers University affiliate scheme. But he hasn't gone away, and there will be other Andrew Tates to come. TikTok pushes harmful content promoting eating disorders and self-harm into users' feeds.






This graph displays the average number of mental health and body image videos shown to Standard Teen Accounts in the first 30 minutes of using the app

Total videos shown on average to Standard Teens






Frankie Thomas took her own life after viewing graphic content online for months


A coroner has ruled a school's failure to prevent a pupil accessing harmful material online on its equipment contributed to her taking her own life.

Frankie Thomas, 15, died at her home in Witley, Surrey, in September 2018, after viewing explicit self-harm material for several months.


An inquest heard her teachers wrongly believed internet filters were in place.

HOW TO GET YOUR IMAGE REMOVED

If you're under 18 and a nude image or video of you has been shared online, you can report it to be removed from the internet. You'll need to:

- Select your age and follow the steps below.
- Create a Childline account so we can send you updates on your report.
- Report your image or video to the Internet Watch Foundation (IWF)
- Check your Childline locker for a few days after your report to see if you need to add any more information and to see updates on your report.
